

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INTRODUCTION

Where is our identity?

Identity is important to all of us. As human beings we need to know who we are and where we belong. Many countries issue their citizens with an identity card. It is proof of who you are and the country where you belong. As a citizen of your country you have certain rights and privileges but also certain responsibilities.

When we become Christians and start to follow Jesus we gain a new identity. Our personality doesn't change, nor does our nationality. However, we become disciples of Jesus Christ. So what does this mean? It means we have new relationships - with God Himself and with His people. We should have new values and priorities. The Bible describes us as being 'in Christ' and God's desire is to change us so that we become more like His son, Jesus Christ. So what does this mean in practice? How will it affect the way we live and the way we view things? If you started to follow Jesus in this country, what will it mean for you to live as a Christian when you return home? 





A Parable of Jesus

Matthew 18:21-35

This is a parable (a story with a deeper meaning) about forgiveness. The Jewish teachers (Rabbis) had discussed how often we should forgive and had decided 'not more than 3 times'! So Peter was being generous!

V22. Some translations read 77 times; some 7×70 (=490) times. The actual numbers are not important. Jesus is saying we should forgive an unlimited number of times. In the same way, the numbers describing the money owed are symbols to show very high and very low amounts.

Section i: What happened? Either summarise what happened or use the questions below:

- 1. How much money did the man owe the king (v24)?
- 2. What did the king decide to do with the servant who owed him money?
- 3. Why did the king change his mind?
- 4. Do you think it would be possible for the man to pay back everything (v26)?
- 5. How much did the fellow servant owe this man?
- 6. How did the man behave towards his fellow servant?
- 7. What did the other servants think of his behaviour?
